

A Devotional Journey Into the Sacred Ordinary



What is worship? Really? Is it something we do only on Sundays--or something we live out on Mondays?

For our purposes, let's define worship as not only a place, a performance, a type of music selection--but as a posture. It's a loving response, a lived expression, a daily offering.

This guide is not intended as a checklist but as a heart shift. These seven acts are not about doing more. Most of us just cannot do MORE. But what we <u>can</u> do is see more of God in what we're already doing.

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. (Romans 12:1)

Please join me as we reframe our concept of worship in the light of God's Word and the Everyday.

### Day One: Worship In The Repetitive

"Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord..." Colossians 3:23



The boss asked Mark to start the presentation with a joke. He shared his paycheck as the first slide.

Whether you have a job, are retired, or are going to school (in order to get a job!), receiving that paycheck, Social Security deposit, or baby sitting pay can be very satisfying. Having an end that justifies the means keeps a lot of people in jobs that no longer feel as fulfilling as they once did. True worship motivates us to do whatever work we're given to do, even the mundane and repetitive, "as working for the Lord." In a life built on integrity, every action is an opportunity. Every opportunity is sacred.



Lord, help me see the sacred in my routines. May each task, chore, and responsibility become an offering of love.



Let's get real--there are tasks we have to do that we just don't like, whether at a job or at home. Write the words, draw the activities out (stick figures work just fine!), or find cut-outs from magazines or online to create a collage of these tasks. Place them on the altar, writing a prayer of surrender if you're willing to reframe them into acts of worship for the Lord.



### Day Two: Worship Through Nourishment

"They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts." Acts 2:46



Recipes are a lot like online dating sites--they never end up looking like their pictures.

In many cultures, traditional recipes, food preparation and meal organization go way beyond what ends up on the plate, representing family, community, fellowship. Cooking, when approached as worship connects the process, the ingredients, the preparer and the recipient with the Creator. When food is shared with people we love, we bind those connections closer. When we share food with strangers, we do what Jesus commanded us to do: feed the hungry as if we are feeding Him (Matthew 25:35-40) Cooking can be a celebration of God's provision, an act of service to those in need, and an act of co-creating with God.



Father, thank You for the gift of nourishment. May my kitchen be filled with Your presence.



Exodus 35:31







Lord, thank You for making me creative. Let my art, in whatever way it is expressed, speak love back to You.







**Fam-i-ly** [fam-uh-lee] (noun) 1. Those you love the most; 2. Those who drive you nuts.


Maybe this definition isn't true of your family, but it certainly takes me back to raising a teenager. When I think of worshiping through compassion, my mind goes to volunteering at a nursing home, or helping at the church's food bank--something that doesn't require every stinking ounce of grace I had in me to deal with a recalcitrant teenager or now an adult son who barely replies, if at all, to my texts. Remind me again, dear Lord, how You deal with me. Time and time again I test Your patience. I act in willful rebellion, seeking my own way. Yet You never leave me nor forsake me. You never stop pursuing me, asking me to come sit with You. Abide with You. Find time just to be with You. Continue to teach me how to love like You love. How to show compassion as You show to me on a daily basis. How to worship You through showing grace, patience, and love to the ones closest to me.

### Day Seven: Worship In Silence

Where is your "silent" place? Your retreat from the noise of the world? Some people like to go to the ocean and walk the beaches. The sound of the waves, the smell of salt water, the regular in-andout rhythm of the tide, all contribute to calm. Some people love the mountains for silent reflection--feeling closer to God in His creation. But what about the Everyday? When we don't have the luxury of actually living near these special places or traveling to them on a moment's notice? By creating a dedicated area, whether a room or a spot set aside for reflection, our worship practice will significantly improve. In the movie, "War Room," the main character repurposes her walk-in closet as a place of prayer. What I liked about that location was the quiet isolation it provided. Whether a room, closet, or designated area, create an easily accessible sanctuary away from the everyday, a place that enables peace, calm, focus, and ushers in God's presence. Silence just isn't the absence of noise--it is the space where we become aware of God as our Everything.
